Dr. Raksha Jain is an associate professor of pulmonary and critical care medicine at the University of Texas Southwestern. She has been on faculty at UT for 10 years, serves as the medical director of the adult cystic fibrosis and the CF therapeutics development program, and runs a laboratory and clinical research program focused on sex and racial disparities work in cystic fibrosis and other illnesses. She is working on understanding biological explanations for male/female differences in host immune response to infections, along with the impact of pregnancy on immune function. She currently serves as vice chair of the CF Foundation Women's Health Research Committee. She is also heavily involved

Dr. May Lau is an associate professor of pediatrics at the University of Texas Southwestern in Dallas and the medical director of the Adolescent and Young Adult Program housed at Children's Health Dallas, where she educates medical students, residents, and fellows in the care of adolescents. A

native New Yorker, Dr. Lau completed her undergraduate degree at Cornell University, medical degree at Albany Medical College, and pediatric residency at Albany Medical Center. She fell in love with Texas during the time she spent at Baylor College of Medicine/Texas Children's Hospital in Houston completing her adolescent medicine fellowship and at the University of Texas - Houston obtaining her Master in Public Health. After practicing adolescent medicine for three years at Nicklaus Children's Hospital in Miami, Florida, Dr. Lau returned to Texas in 2008 to UTSW as the only board-certified, fellowship-trained adolescent medicine specialist. She provides care for adolescent patients for a variety of medical issues, including sexual and reproductive health for all sexual identities and genders, medical management of gender dysphoria/incongruence, and mental health disorders.
